


The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation administers the use of state lands and property easements which provide access to fishing streams throughout the state. Anglers are encouraged to be familiar with all rules and regulations regarding use of New York State fishing waters, which are available from DEC offices and personnel.

On fishing easement lands, anglers may park their cars in developed parking lots, use marked footpaths, and walk the banks of public fishing streams for the purpose of fishing only.

Picnicking, building fires, camping, hunting, trapping or other activities may be enjoyed only by landowner permission.

- When visiting and enjoying any outdoor region, please observe the guidelines for use of forest and other lands:
- What you carry in, carry out. Bring refuse bags and use them. Burying refuse is prohibited.
  - Observe all posted regulations and be considerate of fellow anglers.
  - Always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return.
  - Please leave woods, fishing banks and waters cleaner than you found them.

##### Typical Reservoir Water Temperatures (°F)

Trout need cooler water to thrive, between 55° and 68° for browns. Bass, walleye and pan fish can be found in warmer water.
